Everything you need to know about COVID-19 vaccinations in Asker

Everyone over the age of 18 who lives or is staying in the Municipality of Asker will be offered the COVID-19 vaccine. Taking the vaccine will protect you from disease due to the novel coronavirus.

COVID-19 vaccinations are voluntary and free. The full vaccination requires 2 injections with a few weeks between each injection. The municipality encourages everyone to get vaccinated. The vaccine is safe.

How to register for your COVID-19 vaccination:

- [Click here to register for your vaccination and get on the waiting list.](#) You can register yourself or on behalf of another person. Have your BankID ready.
- When the date of your vaccination approaches, you will receive an SMS from the municipality with a link to book a date and time:
 - Click on the link you receive in the SMS to book a date and time.
 - Choose two dates to book both the 1st and 2nd doses.
 - You will receive an SMS confirming the date, hour and location of your appointment.

An interpreter will assist you if needed.

Location of vaccination stations

- For those of you over the age of 75 or in risk groups, your family doctor can vaccinate you. Your doctor's office will contact you directly when it is your turn.
- A vaccination clinic has been set up at Lensmannsliå 4 (walking distance from the Asker Station and the Asker bus terminal).

When is it my turn?

The Municipality of Asker complies with national priorities for who gets vaccinated first.
